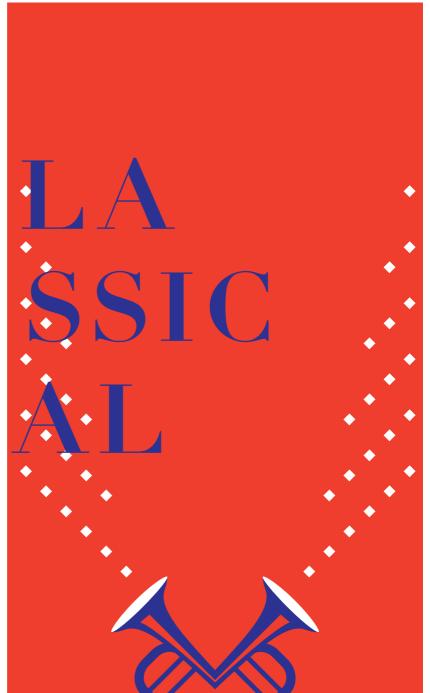

ZADOK THE PRIEST

*** * ***

The first Strathfield Symphony concerts opened with a performance of "God Save the Queen", and this practice continued before mysteriously ceasing after the orchestra's 5th anniversary concert in 1974. For our 50th anniversary, we thought we would recall and embellish on this tradition by programming Handel's majestic Zadok the Priest. In our 50th year, we are practically orchestra royalty being the second oldest community orchestra in NSW.

Zadok the Priest was written for the coronation of King George II in 1727. One of Handel's best-known works, it has been sung at the coronation of every British monarch since its composition. If you're a football fan you might recognise this music as a version of it is used as the theme of the UEFA Champions League, and incidentally, it was the piece first broadcast at the opening transmission of ABC FM, in 1976.

The text is taken from the King James Bible, specifically 1 Kings 1:38-48, describing the anointing of King Solomon.

TEXT

Zadok the Priest, and Nathan the Prophet anointed Solomon King.
And all the people rejoiced, and said:
God save the King! Long live the King!
May the King live for ever,
Amen, Alleluia.

SYMPHONY NO.1

Programming two Haydn works that the orchestra has performed again and again over the years plants this first concert of our 50th Anniversary firmly in the Classical period – a classical concert both in terms of the orchestra's repertoire and where the works sit in musical history. No better way to balance out these traditions than with a work Strathfield Symphony has never played before – in this case, a much newer work making every attempt to fit in with the Classical theme.

Symphony No.1 was written in 1917 to sound like a Symphony written 150 years earlier – Prokofiev had a very clear plan when it came to writing the music: "I thought that if Haydn were alive today he would compose just as he did before, but at the same time would include something new in his manner of composition. I wanted to compose such a symphony: a symphony in the classical style."

Many musical historians cite Prokofiev's Symphony No. 1 as evidence that he, rather than Stravinsky, is the true father of the movement known as 'neo-Classicalism': namely, the twentieth-century composers who revisited the structures and sounds of the Classical period. And yet, the symphony is an exercise in imagination – Prokofiev imagining himself alive and composing back in the eighteenth century – rather than a commitment to the then contemporary movement of Neo-Classicism in music.

CONCERTO FOR TRUMPET







Haydn's Concerto for Trumpet was a strangely regular feature on the SSO programs, being performed every 12–13 years. First performed by Strathfield Symphony in 1972 under the baton of our founding conductor, Richard Gill with soloist Brian McGuiness, again in 1985 Carl Hammond conducted Michael Cleary and finally in 1997 Solomon Bard conducted Helen Blunt. We missed the 13 year cycle in 2010, so we made up for it by programming it for our very special celebration year.

Haydn wrote his Trumpet Concerto for an old friend called Anton Weidinger who had made a new type of valved trumpet with flute-like keys that could play more notes than the valveless trumpet of the time. Haydn had poached Wiedinger from Vienna and wrote the piece to entice him to stay with his band in the employ of the Austro-Hungarian Esterházy family.

MATTHEW GATLEY, TRUMPET

2019 is Matthew Gately's third year as Principal Trumpet for the Strathfield Symphony Orchestra. In 2018 Matthew completed his Master of Music Studies (Performance), at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music. He has studied with great Australian trumpeters such as Leanne Sullivan, Daniel Mendelow and Paul Goodchild. Additionally he has received the prestigious FTCL and LTCL Diplomas, AMusA, and BMus. Over the past 20 years has established himself as a performer on trumpet and cornet with a focus on both Classical and 20th century repertoires.

JOSEPH HAYDN (1732 - 1809)



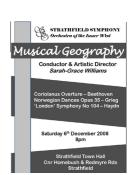
THE LONDON SYMPHONY, NO. 104

This performance of Haydn's London Symphony will mark the fifth occasion it has been programmed by Strathfield Symphony – an appropriate occasion for the orchestra's 50th year. First performed in 1973 with our founding conductor, Richard Gill, repeat performances were programmed by every long serving conductor over the orchestra's 50 year history. 1993 under the baton of Matthew Krell, 1998 with Solomon Bard and 2008 conducted by Sarah-Grace Williams. This performance gives our current conductor, Sadaharu Muramatsu an opportunity to join in the tradition.

NOTES FROM OUR 2008 PROGRAM

Haydn's two residencies in England proved to be some of the happiest years of his life. The composer's genius thrived and his audiences loved him. In addition to the twelve 'London' symphonies, his last works in the genre, Haydn also composed piano sonatas, chamber music, and songs to English texts. Symphony No. 104 in D, the last of the group, has been variously nicknamed 'London' or 'Salomon' and was first heard on an all-Haydn program at the King's Theatre on May 4 1795 led by the composer. Of the event, Haydn wrote in his diary that 'the whole company was thoroughly pleased and so was I. I made 4000 gulden on this evening: such a thing is possible only in England.'

As coincidence would have it, today's performance may be linked to the premiere by Haydn in London in 1795. One of our cellists plays an instrument made by London luthier William Forster II around 1785. Forster made cellos for King George III and was a notable music publisher and entrepreneur who brought Haydn to London and published his twelve London symphonies (this is No 12). Perhaps this cello was in Haydn's orchestra for the first performance.





S A D A H A R U M U R A M A T S U

Born in Aichi, Japan and based in Sydney, Australia, Dr Sadaharu Muramatsu (Sada) is the Artistic Director of Strathfield Symphony Orchestra, Guest Conductor of Symphonia Jubilate (2019 – 2020), Lecturer and Conductor at Excelsia College (formerly Wesley Institute), Conductor of Suzuki Cello Ensemble and Artistic Director of Sydney Sakura Choir. Recently, he also conducted the Nagoya Philharmonic Orchestra and Central Aichi Symphony Orchestra in Japan, and has concerts planned in Japan for 2020.

Sada completed a Masters of Music in Conducting at the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester and a fellowship to study conducting at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music, University of Sydney under the Japanese Government Overseas Study Program for Artists. Sada resides in Australia under a Distinguished Talent visa granted by the Australian Government for his achievements as a conductor

His accomplishments include Consul-General of Japan's Commendation Award in Sydney (2018), an Honorary Doctorate in Music from his alumnus Anglia Ruskin University in Cambridge, UK (2011); second prize in the Vienna Summa Cum Laude International Youth Music Festival with the Wesley Institute Choir in the Golden Hall, Musikverein, Austria (2011); finalist and awarded Special Prize of the Jury at the Emmerich Kalman International Conductor's Competition at the Budapest Operetta Theatre, Hungary (2007); semi-finalist in the 2nd Bartok Bela International Opera-Conducting Competition in Romania (2007); Mortimer Furber Prize for Conducting in Manchester, UK (2005); and First prize at the ISIS Conducting Competition in Cambridge, UK (2001).

Sada studied conducting under Imre Pallo, Kurt Masur, Sir Mark Elder CBE, Hirofumi Misawa and Kazuki Sawa.
